Lea Redfern is a Lecturer in Media and Communications specialising in audio and cultural studies, including the research and production of narratives in radio and podcasting.

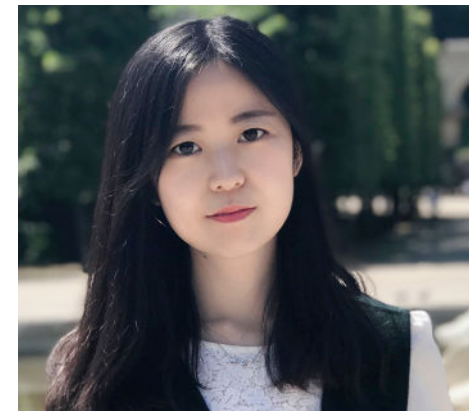

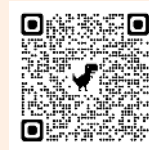
